Class G License (Armed Security Officer):

Annual ‘G’ Requalification:

- Maintain your Class G certification by completing the mandatory Annual ‘G’ Requalification Class each year.

Step 3. Submit Application

- After completing the course, fill out the application form for the [Class D](#) or [Class G](#) license on the [Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services \(FDACS\) website](#).
- Submit your fingerprints for a background check through an FDACS-approved [LiveScan service provider](#).
- You will need to include a passport-style photo taken within the last 30 days.
- Pay the [required fees](#) (approximately **\$45 for Class D** and **\$112 for Class G**, plus fingerprinting fees).
- **For the Class D license**, after completing the course and passing the test, submit the application at an FDACS office, where you will be fingerprinted and photographed. Payment must be made by money order or check. You will receive a blue temporary card

to start working immediately, with the official license arriving by mail between 30-90 days.

- **For the Class G license**, the application process is not digital. Complete the state application in black ink and submit it with the payment, photo, and fingerprints. Include the G course completion certificate and Firearms Proficiency Certificate. Unlike the Class D license, there is no temporary card for the Class G license, and you must wait to receive it by mail before starting armed duty, which can take one to three months.

Step 4. Wait for Approval

FDACS will review your application. If approved, you'll receive your security officer license by mail; which typically takes several weeks up to three months tops.

Step 5. Maintain Certification

The Class D and Class G licenses both require renewal to stay certified. The Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services will send you a renewal application form along with detailed instructions on how to complete the renewal process when it comes time to do so.

- **Class D License:** This license is valid for 2 years. It is recommended to start the renewal process 45-60 days before the expiration date to avoid any lapse in your license.
 - **Renewal License Fee:** \$45
- **Class G License:** This license is valid for 2 years. To maintain the license, every year you need to complete 4 hours of firearms instruction and requalification. It is recommended to sign up for an Annual G-Requal class approx. 60-90 days in advance so that your G-license doesn't get suspended. If it does, you will need to retake the 28-hour state-required course.
 - **Renewal License Fee:** \$112

[The Annual G-Requal Class](#), required to maintain the Class G license, is a yearly 4-hour session held monthly on the third Friday, from 3pm to 7pm.

The Annual G-Requal Class is required every year before the expiration date on their G-license. Missing this requalification **even by one day** will result in the license being suspended, and the officer will have to retake the 28-hour Class G course. Each caliber firearm an officer will use on duty must be qualified in the Annual G-Requal class, with a shooting test for each caliber.

Example: An individual may bring in both a 9MM and a .45ACP and must successfully complete a shooting test with each caliber to be qualified to carry them. This process is known as a Firearms Proficiency Test, where the individual is evaluated on each specific caliber they wish to be certified to carry. The same testing requirements apply to rifles and shotguns.
